FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

The Sydney Morning Herald of 3 April 1982, page 2, features an article by Alan Gill, headed "Now the Archbishop gets a grilling" referring, of course, to the newly appointed Anglican Archbishop of Sydney, Archbishop Donald Robinson. The report includes a paragraph which will be of interest to all C.B.ers and which reads as follows: Quote - In answer to a question Archbishop Robinson revealed he had an unusual World War II record. He was a member of a top allied intelligence organisation known as Central Bureau. The Bureau was responsible for decoding and analysing interceptions of Japanese military and wireless traffic in the South West Pacific area. It was the forerunner of the present Defence Signals Division - unquote.

That certainly brought back memories, for Don (as we knew him) was in fact posted to No.3 W.U. then located off the Batchelor Road (the site of the present Rum Jungle mining operation) some 70 miles south of Darwin. He was assigned to the Unit as my 2 i/c, as I was then O.C. of Intell. Section, having succeeded F1. Lt. George Reveleigh some 6 months earlier. Don was a very bright and likeable young Army Lieut. and I eventually handed the Section over to him at the conclusion of my 13 months tour of duty in July '45. It may be of interest to those members of C.B. who knew me then to hear that after making my report to W.Cmdr. Booth of RAAF Command Brisbane (then rear H.Q. of C.B.) I proceeded on leave and was to report to RAAF Command on 20 August for onward movement to C.B. at San Miguel (Philippines) and posting to the Task Force which was to stage the invasion of Southern Japan on 25 September 1945.

But the Japs ceased flying on 16 Aug. as we all know, and I spent the next 2 months in Brisbane awaiting discharge. But Air Board Personnel Postings, in their wisdom, saw fit to reclassify me from Intell. to Admin. (I originally joined the RAAF as a Clerk General Group 3) and posted me to Rathmines Flying Boat Base as Station H.Q. Adjutant, where I "happily" spent the next 6 months signing thousands of discharge movement orders before my own came through in March '46. And guess who signed my Interim Discharge Certificate at the Showground none other than F/O Arthur Brown, the former Sigs officer at 3 W.U. and popular sports organiser! By the way, I contacted Don Robinson a couple of years ago, when he was Bishop of Parramatta, and tried to enlist him into our Association but unfortunately he had to decline on account of his extensive involvement in Church affairs. Nevertheless, and on behalf of all members of Central Bureau Intelligence Corps Association, I wish Don every success in his new appointment.
