OBLUARY

Professor T.G. Room

Professor Thomas Gerald Room, Emeritus Professor of Mathematics at Sydney University, died last Wednesday.

Professor Room, who was born in England on November 10, 1902, was educated in London and Cambridge.

He began his lecturing career at Liverpool University, where he was lecturer in mathematics from 1925 to 1927. Following this he lectured extensively and held various posts in the UK and the US.

In 1935 he came to Australia to take up his post as Professor of Mathematics at Sydney University, where he taught until 1968. From 1952 to 1956 he was Dean of the Faculty of Science.

He is survived by his wife, son and two daughters.

Bob Burnside.

Bob's "Profile" appeared some years ago in the Australian Ingelligence Association Magazine and here it is again, in part.

Soon after WW2 began, Bob applied to join the RAAF Aircrew, but like so many others, found the waiting period lengthy and frustrating, and so joined the AIF just after the Dunkirk debacle, on June 3, 1940. By November 1940 he was in Palestine as a member of the Sig Platoon of the 2/1 Pioneer Battalion, and then it was North Africa and the famous siege of Tobruk. In June 1941 he was wounded by mortar fragments and after an urgent operation was eventually evacuated several nights later by HMAS Stuart. After a second operation at 2/2 AGH at El Kantara on the Canal, he boarded the hospital ship Manunda on August 18 for shipment home. Bob goes on, "After a bit of leave, into Concord, more physiotherapy and a medical board in June 1942, resulting in being declared medically B Class, something new in the AIF. They gave me two stripes and a desk job at Victoria Barracks.


Then one day on a tram I met Capt. Edgar Kelson, whom I had known slightly before the war. He started talking about some vague unit and said he was looking for people to join it. I said 'OK' and forgot all about it. Then in January 1943, a party of about fifty, from all over NSW, were assembled at Liverpool and eventually shoved on a troop train for Brisbane, and Central Bureau.

I attended a Japanese language school in Melbourne 1943/4, for nine months. In late December 1944 I took off for Hollandia en route to Leyte, then to Luzon in the Philippines.

At the end of the war I was with a large part of CB at San Miguel, North of Manila. Although VJ Day was August 15 it was not until October 10 that the legion of the lost at San Miguel embarked at Manila on a Liberty ship headed for home. I firmly believe that AHQ in Melbourne had forgotten all about us. Probably only a few key people knew of our existence.

After a rather erratic trip (the Captain admitted that he didn't have all the charts needed, and we feared we might bump into an island one night), we finally disembarked at Brisbane on October 27 opposite the Hamilton pub, and were taken to Chermside.

After discharge in December 1945, I returned to the Advertising Department of the Sydney Morning Herald where I met Jean, my wife-to-be, and we were married in 1948. Like most of us, the years since WW2 revolved around my civilian and family life until other memories were revived with the formation of our Central Bureau Association. I was President for a couple of years, and then Publicity Officer for a while, but recently, for health reasons, have been unable to attend the meetings."
