<u>DSD EVENTS</u>. The Defence Signals Directorate in Canberra invites CBers to an Open Day at its Russell Street headquarters on Friday, March 30, between 1pm (1300) and 3pm (1500). This is to celebrate the 60th anniversary of DSD's establishment (as DSB) on April 1, 1947. Central Bureau was the precursor of these organizations.

The 2007 celebrations start on March 30. The invitation from Stewart Skelt, Chair of the 60th Anniversary Committee, says that the proposed programme for the afternoon of March 30 will include a tour of "selected areas" within DSD, during which several speeches will be made.

The gathering is informal, but those who plan to go must let President Gordon Gibson know by Friday, March 16. He will pass on the names to DSD, so that these CBers may be signed in at the gate. You need to be at this entrance – Russell Northgate on Russell Drive outside the Russell Offices of DSD by 12.30pm (1230) or 12.45pm (1245) at the latest. Signing in takes time and there will be former DSD members signing in as well.

The DSD 60th Anniversary Ball will be held on the evening of Friday March 30, at the National Museum of Australia, Acton Peninsula, starting with pre-dinner drinks from 7pm. (1900 hours). The theme for the ball is 1940s. (If anyone knows the nineteen forties, we do!) Each ticket costs \$110. If you can run to this, and if you're still limber enough to demonstrate your dancing skills, please get in touch with DSD as soon as you receive this Newsletter as many will be attending and there are restrictions on ticket numbers. ANZAC EVE AND ANZAC DAY, 2007 - ALTERED ARRANGEMENTS FOR BOTH

This is the Centenary Year of the Australian Intelligence Corps. Because of this the Australian Intelligence Association has invited CBICA to join it in two special ceremonies.

On <u>ANZAC EVE</u> we meet at the corner of Martin Place and Pitt, close to the old GPO. <u>Please be there by 1815hrs</u>, ready for the service which begins at 1830hrs. This meeting time is earlier than usual).

This special service starts with the mounting of the Catafalque Guard, and march on of the Associations. A padre will read the Anzac Prayer which commemorates "sacrifices made in the cause of peace" by men and women who have served during the years from 1907 to the present.

A hymn "The Day is Ended" will precede the wreath laying, the Ceremony of Remembrance, the Last Post, the Ode and Reveille. The whole service, as is customary, will be close to the Cenotaph in Sydney's Martin Place.

ANZAC DAY MARCH. The meeting place this year will be at a new site – the corner of Castlereagh Street and Hunter Streets. The time also has changed. <u>Please</u> <u>be there by 0900</u>. In this Centenary year, AIA and CBICA have been given a prominent place – at the head of Corps Troops of World War II. Please watch for the green and gold CBICA banner.

The RSL is providing a Landrover for us. Places in this are limited, and the RSL advises that riders in the Landrover and any other vehicles must <u>sit</u> not stand.

The RSL also says that "one descendant of a deceased veteran . . . may honour their service by wearing the veteran's medals on their right breast and participating in the march."
