Unit History

President Gordon reports that in a telephone conversation with Nola Anderson, Acting Director of the Australian War Memorial, he had been given an assurance that the Unit History will be published at no cost by the Army History Unit's Publication Program after final vetting by Ian Pfenningwerth and Army History editor, Dr Robert Nichols and that CBICA will receive a courtesy copy of the manuscript prior to publication. All the above will be subject to final approval by the Director of the A.W.M, General Gower.

SIGNALS

One of the saddest signals ever sent must have been that of January 20, 1942; just before eight Wirraways took off from Rabaul airport in a futile attempt to defend it from an attack by about 120 Japanese aircraft.

The signal, in Latin, read: "Morituri te salutand". This was the salutation of Roman gladiators to Caesar on entering the arena. It meant "We who are about to die salute you."

According to the Australian Encyclopedia six of the aerial gladiators were killed and five wounded. WgCdr John Lerew, DFC sent the encyphered message form which is now on display in the Airpower in the Pacific 1941 – 1953 Gallery.

Rabaul endured Japanese occupation and great tragedy. Many soldiers and civilians put aboard the *Montevideo Maru* died when an American submarine torpedoed the ship, not knowing that prisoners-of-war were aboard.
