I haven't marched for years, but remember asking <u>Dennis Moore</u> why our green and gold banner had holes in it. Banner Carrier Dennis replied that the holes were to prevent wind filling the banner like a sail and sending the banner bearers flying.

Since the death of Dennis, his son, Rob, has taken on the banner bearing duty. Rob says there's been an improvement in banner design. He'll describe it for us when he has time. The late <u>Les McClean</u>'s son, David, has been a banner carrier, and the clan was there. (How well we remember the times when Les presided over our gatherings at the restaurant, Philip's Foote, in The Rocks.)


In conclusion I would offer a quote from the speech made by Derek Dalton, Assistant Secretary of Australian Signals Directorate, at Henry St during that commemoration:-

JOY GRANGER September 1, 1921 to March, 31, 2016



On April 6th some CBers were able to attend the "Mass for the Repose of the Soul of Joy Granger", for so long secretary of CBICA, and for so long, our friend.

The Service was held at the RSL War Veterans' Village Chapel on Collaroy Plateau – the place where Joy had made her home amid bushland for many years.

At 21 Henry St she worked in the grand old mansion. Of this time she said, "I was alone in a room. A hand would pass a message through a window. Other hands took the message away!" Only after the war did we meet her and she us. The opening music at the Service was J.S. Bach's Cantata No 208 "Sheep May Safely Graze" and the Communion Hymn was J.S. Bach's beautiful "Wachet aut, ruft uns die Stimme". For many years Joy had played the organ in this chapel. In the next Newsletter we will print an edited version of the moving Eulogy given by her nephew Robbie Granger. Two

other nephews, Michael Granger and Richard Porteous, gave spoken "reflections" of their aunt.

When the service ended, Joy's relatives and friends gathered for refreshments in the adjacent Lone Pine Room.

Passed away November 29, 2015

Stan Harper was originally a member of the RAAF Wireless Unit's Association (which finished up in 2013) along with Will Renshaw, Allan Norton, Jack Bleakley, Keith Falconer and a number of other characters.


He spent 2.5 years in the RAAF. He was in uniform seven days after his 18th birthday. He was also involved with the Signal Intelligence Service in the Philippines and he actually worked for General Douglas Macarthur, who had set up Central Bureau, which developed into a huge unit. Stan listened to Japanese messages and passed them on to translators. Many said this unit shortened the war.


Stan went to Biak - there were 70,000 American troops there and a small contingent of Aussies. He then moved to Leyte Island in the Philippines. Twenty Aussies then moved to Manila where they had led the whole intelligence group. Later he moved to San Miguel. He

had a good time there and was treated well. Stan commented that the RAAF offered him a lot and the experience assisted him. In hindsight he was too young to appreciate what was offered to him. In recent times he has been treated well by Veterans Affairs.

Stan was a Rotarian... in the truest sense of the word! He honoured the badge for 39 years, and fulfilled with distinction many positions at the Rotary Club of Forest Hill including being a much-loved president in 1986/87. His warm heart and creative intellect was dedicated to the

essence of Rotary. Mentor of many, alert to the needs of visitors and new members, he was Mr Reliable. Stan was active in projects big and small - tirelessly working alongside others - a great team player. A conscientious DG's representative, a clear-thinking secretary for a 1300 strong district conference, Stan the man endeared himself to many other Clubs, Rotarians and fellow citizens. Stan and Joan generously hosted exchange students including a student from China. Stan was the recipient of a Paul Harris Fellowship and three sapphires, a committed centurion and a benefactor. The latter means that his contribution to the Rotary Foundation will continue to aid people around the world after his death.





Stan and Joan generously set up the Harper Family bequest which has been used to support community service projects for • The young in sporting and education fields • Handicapped and disadvantaged people. The aged Stan's outstanding service to the local community was recognized by the City of Whitehorse with a citizenship award.

In celebration of his long and distinguished Rotary career and his 90th birthday, the Rotary Club of Forest Hill enjoyed a delightful evening with Stan, Joan and the family. One of Nature's gentlemen, Stan Harper you have indeed been a gift to the world and you have inspired many-we salute you.

Snippets of family history, as told to Grahame Vidler, in 1995.

During the second World War, Maureen was in the WAAAF as an ACW, in which position she operated in Morse code and teleprinters - both classified positions and well paid. Her initial training was in Melbourne, thence to Townsville, Charters Towers and Bundaberg. She had contact with planes patrolling the coast and with troops in Darwin. In addition to the above skills, Maureen also learnt semaphore and the Aldus lamp.

Upon her marriage to Bob Blenheim, he wouldn't give permission for her to go to New Guinea – this was standard practice for husbands of married staff.

When it came time to be a mother, she didn't know that she was carrying twins! Carol was born at 6.20 pm, and Anne at 6.30. What a surprise!

When Maureen died on 14th November 2000, aged 79, she left behind 6 children, 13 grandchildren, and 8 great grandchildren.
























